## PBA Commission on the Women in the Profession **2000 Report Card Executive Summary**

The 2000 Report Card is the sixth one published by the Commission on Women in the Profession. What began as an overview of women's participation in the PBA has grown over the years into an overview of women's roles, not only in the PBA but throughout the profession.

Included in the 2000 Report Card are statistics on:

- Women in the 100 largest law firms in the Commonwealth (based on survey results returned by 38 of the 100 firms surveyed)
- The role of women in the offices of District Attorneys and Public Defenders (based on survey results returned by 34 of the 67 District Attorney offices and 34 of the 67 Public Defender offices)
- The number of women who are members of the PBA by county
- Women judges for the Courts of Common Pleas, Pennsylvania Appellate Courts and the Federal Courts in Pennsylvania

The information gathered over the years concerning the PBA is positive:

- The PBA had it's first woman President, Leslie Anne Miller, in 1999
- Women's membership rose from 22.9% in 1996 to 25% in 2000
- Women members of the PBA Board of Governors rose from 16.7% in 1996/97 to 45.8% in 1999/00
- Women comprise 40% of the 1999/00 PBA Nominating Committee

The 2000 Report Card reflects both good and bad news for women in the profession. There is always room for improvement and one area is in committee membership where 15 committees have less than 20% women members.

Women are under-represented in law firm management (such as Managing Partners, Department Heads and Partners) with only one firm reporting a woman managing partner. Our survey results show only 1 woman District Attorney and 3 women Public Defenders.

The Commission continues, through its annual conference and activities throughout the year, to both celebrate the progress women lawyers have made and to focus on increasing the number of women lawyers in leadership positions.

## PBA Commission on Women in the Profession

### **The Anne X. Alpern Award**

In 1994, the Commission created an annual award to be presented to a woman attorney in Pennsylvania who has been an outstanding legal professional as well as a mentor for other attorneys. The Anne X. Alpern Award was named after the first woman to serve as a state attorney general in the United States. In 1959 Governor David Lawrence appointed Anne Alpern to the position of attorney general for Pennsylvania. Two years later, Governor Lawrence appointed Anne Alpern to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, making her Pennsylvania's first woman appellate judge. Justice Alpern died in 1981. By naming its award in memory of this legal pioneer, the Commission honors her outstanding achievement as a role model for all women attorneys.

### 2000 Recipient

The 2000 Anne X. Alpern recipient is Judge Carolyn Engel Temin. Judge Temin earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the University of Pennsylvania in 1955 and a Law Degree (L.L.B./J.D.) from the University of Pennsylvania Law School in 1958. She began her career as the first woman to be hired on the staff of the Defender Association of Philadelphia and later served as Chief Counsel to the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole, and as an Assistant District Attorney.

Judge Temin was elected to the bench of the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County (the court of general jurisdiction) in 1983 and retained for a second ten year term in 1993. Presently assigned to the Civil Trial Division, she previously served for four and one-half years as Chief Criminal Calendar Judge.

In 1992-1993 Judge Temin became the first woman to be elected President of the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges and she is author of the Pennsylvania Benchbook for Criminal Proceedings. Judge Temin is active in many professional and community organizations, including the American Bar Association, National Association of Women Judges, Publication Society, Arden Theatre, Philadanco, and the Philadelphia Dance Alliance. She was elected to membership in the American Law Institute in 1997.



## Women in the Profession Survey Results **Private Sector Law Firms**

These statistics are the result of survey forms sent to the 100 largest law firms in Pennsylvania. The survey forms are sent out in late January and firms are asked to respond within three weeks. Survey responses are voluntary and firms are promised anonymity. 2000 was only the second year that this information was gathered. In 1999, 51 firms responded while in 2000 only 38 firms responded.

Important statistics for 2000 include:

- Women comprise 27.1% of all lawyers
- Women comprise less than 3% of Managing Partners
- Only 1 woman Managing Partner as compared to 4 in 1999
- Women are 10.5% of the Department Heads
- Women comprise 15.4% of the Partners in the firms
- Woman comprise 40.4% of the Associates
- Women comprise 74.2% of the Part-Timers
- Of the 38 firms responding, in 14 of the 25 firms with part-time positions, 100% of the part-timers are women

Women are very under-represented in the higher ranking positions of Managing Partners, Department Heads and Partners. They are over-represented in the lowest paying, least powerful and least prestigious positions of Associates and Part-Timers.

### Women in the Profession Survey Results **Public Sector**

The statistics compiled as to the role of women in District Attorneys' Offices and Public Defenders' Offices are the result of the number of surveys returned. 34 out of the 67 District Attorneys' Offices surveyed returned forms and 34 out of the 67 Public Defenders' Offices surveyed returned forms. As with the private sector, the forms were sent out in late January and anonymity was promised to responding offices.

The survey response rate was down in general from 1999, which was the first year that this information was gathered. In 1999, 43 of the 67 District Attorneys' Offices responded and 33 of 67 Public Defenders' Offices responded. The pattern of under-representation of women in the higher ranking positions and over-representation in the lower ranking positions as seen in the private sector is mirrored in the public sector.

### **District Attorney**

- Women make up 34.3% of the lawyers in District Attorneys' Offices
- There is only 1 woman District Attorney, or 3% of the District Attorneys
- There are only 8, or 28.6% woman First Assistant District Attorneys
- Women comprise 25% of the Part-Timers, but Part-Time Assistant District Attorney positions are desirable positions

#### Public Defender

- Women make up 27.5% of the lawyers in Public Defendersí Offices
- There are 3 women Public Defenders, or 8.8% of the Public Defenders
- There are 9, or 37.5%, women First Assistant Public Defenders
- Women comprise 27% of the Part-Timers, but as with Part-Time Assistant District Attorney positions, these are desirable positions








### Federal Judiciary

## THIRD CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS

The Federal Appellate Court for Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and the Virgin Islands is composed of 11 judges. Three of the five women judges are from Pennsylvania.

The PBA Board of Governors manages and carries out policies established by the House of Delegates. The Board is comprised of the following members:

- PBA general officers (President, President-Elect, Vice President, Chair of the House of Delegates, Secretary and Treasurer)
- the Immediate Past President
- three representatives from the Young Lawyers Division
- one Zone Governor from each of the twelve zones
- two governors-at-large (one minority governor and one woman governor)

The Pennsylvania Bar Association has welcomed women lawyers into its leadership. The participation of women on the Board of Governors has grown during the 1990s. This is due in part to the 1991 Bylaws amendment establishing the position of an at-large governor to represent women's interests. In 1999/00, the number of women on the Board increased by three over the previous year. The 11 women members comprise almost half the Board. For the second year, the increase was due to the election of women zone governors and the election of another woman Chair-Elect of the Young Lawyers Division.

There is a history of improvement in the status of women since 1995.

- Women were 20.8% of the Board of Governors in 1995 and are 45.8% today
- The number of women increased from 8 in 1999 to 11 in 2000


The Nominating Committee selects one candidate for each of the general offices of the association to be presented to the House of Delegates for consideration. The committee, derived from the Board of Governors, consists of:

- all zone governors
- the minority governor
- the woman governor
- the five living immediate past presidents of the PBA
- the immediate past chair of the Young Lawyers Division


The Nominating Committee seats held by women increased in 1999/00 from 5 to 8 representing 40% of the Committee.

## **House of Delegates**

The House of Delegates sets the policy of the PBA and is comprised of the following members:

- PBA general officers (President, President-Elect, Vice President, Chair of the House of Delegates, Secretary and Treasurer)
- all Zone Governors
- one member from each zone for each 100 active members
- one additional member from each unit membership zone
- living former PBA presidents and chairs of the House
- one representative of each county bar association
- the preceding secretary, treasurer and zone governors
- delegates of sections and the Young Lawyers Division
- the Attorney General of Pennsylvania
- state delegates to the ABA House
- the Court Administrator of Pennsylvania
- deans of Pennsylvania law schools

Participation by women in the House of Delegates increased from 18.3% in 1997/98 to 25% this year. This mirrors the percentage of women members in the PBA.

The number of women in the House continues to increase. In 1998/99 there were 70 women and this year there are 87. In 1998/99 for the first time, each of the 12 zones has named women delegates to the House. Unfortunately in 1999/00 one of the 12 zones has no women delegates.

Annual fluctuations in membership, as well as other factors, affect the number of representatives in a particular zone. The members of the House of Delegates are selected by election within each zone. The overall percentage of women Delegates is identical to the overall percentage of women members of the PBA. Some Zones may need to be more inclusive.


Since 1995, the following Zones have consistently had high percentages of women Delegates:

- Zone 1 Philadelphia
- Zone 3 Adams, Cumberland, Dauphin, Franklin, Juniata, Lancaster, Lebanon, Perry and York
- Zone 12 Allegheny

This year, the following Zones have less than 12% women Delegates:

- Zone 2 Berks, Carbon, Lehigh, Northampton and Schuylkill
- Zone 4 Columbia, Lycoming, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder and Union
- Zone 5 Bradford, Lackawanna, Luzerne, Monroe, Pike, Sullivan, Susquehanna, Wayne and Wyoming
- Zone 7 Clarion, Crawford, Erie, Forest, Jefferson, McKean, Warren and Venango
- Zone 8 Bedford, Blair, Cambria, Fulton, Huntingdon, Indiana, Mifflin and Somerset

Since 1995, Zone 8 has consistently had the lowest percentage of women Delegates.



### Pennsylvania Bar Association **Committees**

In 1999/00, there are 52 committees listed in the Resource Guide to the PBA. Each committee addresses an area of concern in the practice of law. Generally, the committees have leadership of chairs and vice chairs.

Participation of women on committees continues to fluctuate from year to year. In reviewing the percentage of women on committees, it is important to keep in mind that women represent 25% of the total PBA membership in 1999/00.

In terms of committee leadership, 28 women served as chairs or co-chairs of the 52 committees in 1999/00. This is an increase of four women leaders compared to 1998/99. The number of women vice chairs or co-vice chairs in 1999/00 was 15, up from 14 the previous year. The percentage of women in leadership positions has slightly increased although there was an increase in the committees from 45 in 1998/99 to 52 in 1999/00.

## Pennsylvania Bar Association **Sections/Councils**

There are currently 17 sections in the Pennsylvania Bar Association. Sections are comprised of active PBA members, and any PBA member may become a member of any section or sections. Each section may have a:

- chair
- vice chair
- secretary
- other officers within a subsection
- committee established by the section's bylaws
- council established by the section's bylaws

In 1999/00, there are 2 women section chairs and 3 women vice chairs, as compared to 1 chair and 2 vice chairs in 1998/99. Secretary/Treasurer positions held by women increased from 3 in 1998/99 to 4 in 1999/00. Section Delegate positions decreased from 2 in 1998/99 to 1 in 1999/00.

Women are not as well represented in the leadership of the Sections as they are in the leadership of Committees.

Women are under-represented on the councils, in comparison to women's section membership, in the following Sections:

- Aeronautical Law
- Criminal Law
- Education Law
- Intellectual Property
- Labor Law
- Tax Law
- Workers Compensation

Women have consistently been unrepresented or under-represented in the leadership of the Sections on Aeronautical Law, Criminal Law and Labor Law.

## **Young Lawyers Division Leadership**


- Chair

It bodes well for the future of the Young Lawyers Division that women continue to participate actively in its leadership roles.

This year 57% of the leadership positions, 4 of 7 officers, are held by women:

- Chair
- Chair-Elect
- Secretary
- ABA/YLD District Representative

This represents an increase in 1 seat held by women in 1999/00 compared to 3 seats in 1998/99.







## Pennsylvania Bar Association **Report Card Conclusion**

For the sixth year, the PBA Commission on Women in the Profession has prepared a Report Card. Originally patterned after the ABA Report Card, the PBA Commission on Women in the Profession Report Card has evolved every year. It has changed and expanded with the hope of illuminating the roles of women in the Pennsylvania Bar Association and the legal profession.

Starting in 1994, the Report Card focused on the PBA membership and the positions and numbers of women in the organization. Six years later, this is still an important focus of the Report Card, but the Report Card has grown to include more information on women within the profession. The 2000 Report Card looks at numbers and positions of women in private law firms as well as public offices such as District Attorneys and Public Defenders. For the first time, numbers on women in the judiciary are reported.

The Commission on Women in the Profession issues this Report Card yearly to serve as a measure of the evolving participation of women in the legal profession in Pennsylvania. The Commission hopes, in keeping with our Mission Statement, the Report Card will help identify barriers as well as reveal opportunities for women within the profession.

It remains the belief and goal of this Commission that with all members working together, we will create a strong and vital profession and PBA. Together we will be prepared to meet the challenges facing our society and profession.

The Commission on Women in the Profession's mission is to:

Included in this objective are issues relating to the advancement of women within law firms, job opportunities for women, gender discrimination in the profession and ways and means by which women can utilize the Bar Association as a continuing organization to help solve and resolve problems unique to women in the profession.
- 2. Assess the current status of women in the legal profession and identify their career paths and goals.
- 3. Develop educational programs to address discrimination against women lawyers and the unique problems they encounter in pursuing their professional careers.
- 4. Make recommendations to the PBA Board of Governors and House of Delegates for action to solve problems the Commission identifies.
- 5. Make recommendations to the Courts, legislature and other groups within the justice system to solve problems the Commission identifies through the approval of the Board of Governors and House of Delegates.
