# INTRODUCTION & ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

Welcome to the 2001 Statewide High School Mock Trial Competition! Temple-LEAP, supported by the Young Lawyers Division of the Philadelphia Bar Association, began the first mock trial efforts in Pennsylvania with a Philadelphia competition that is now entering its twenty-first year. The Pennsylvania Bar Association's Young Lawyers Division took the program statewide in 1984.

This year's case materials were created by Rob Stapleton, a third year student at Temple University Beasley School of Law. John Drost, Temple University Beasley School of Law Visiting Professor and Director of the LL.M. in Trial Advocacy at Temple, supervised the writing of the problem during the spring and summer of 2000. Temple-LEAP sincerely thanks Mr. Stapleton and Professor Drost for their wonderful efforts in drafting the problem.

The problem centers around the Bushing residence in Owlville, New Temple County. On trial is Al Bushing, who is being sued by Terry Gorey. Gorey was shot by Chris Bushing, Al's child, with a handgun that Al purchased on the morning the incident occurred. Chris shot Terry when the two went into the Bushing house. Al Bushing and Georgie Gorey, Chris' parent, had gone inside so that Al could show Georgie the new gun. Al was called away from the room, leaving the gun on a desk and telling Georgie to lock up. Georgie left the room a few minutes later and rejoined Al outside for the barbecue. Chris then entered the house to use the bathroom, and when s/he was done, s/he went to get Terry. They both went back into the house and entered the study where Al kept the gun collection. There is a dispute over how the children gained entrance to the study. Georgie claims to have shut the door and Terry says that it was Chris' idea to enter the study. Al claims that it was Terry's idea to enter the room and that it was Georgie's fault the shooting occurred because Georgie never put the gun back into the cabinet. Chris eventually picked up the gun while in the study and began to walk over to the cabinet. Terry, who was standing next to the cabinet, is shot when the gun is fired. Terry sustained an injury to his/her leg and spent the summer with the doctors, who performed surgery and helped him/her rehabilitate the leg. The issue in this case is whether Al Bushing is liable for the harm suffered by Terry because of the manner in which the gun was accessible to two minor children.

The 2001 case materials were revised and edited for competition purposes by Temple-LEAP staff under the auspices of the Young Lawyer's Division of the Pennsylvania Bar Association (PBA/YLD). A number of Philadelphia and statewide volunteers helped fine tune the problem. Susan Donmoyer of the Pennsylvania Bar Association provided administrative assistance to the competition. Members of the PBA/YLD Mock Trial Committee headed by Harrisburg attorneys Jane Meyer and Desiree Petrus provided support in producing the problem and coordinating the statewide competition. Anne Panfil, Chief counsel for the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court and Donna Adelsberger, a civil defense attorney in Montgomery County, reviewed the problem in its earliest stages and offered many helpful suggestions to the problem committee. Harrisburg attorney Alan Boynton,

chairperson of the 1996 National Mock Trial Competition that was held in Pittsburgh, provided his usual expert assistance in preparing the problem for competition purposes. Many others who reviewed the drafts and offered their suggestions are also owed a debt of gratitude for their support of the young people of Pennsylvania.

Thanks goes to LEAP Program Director Roberta West, Karen Forman, Public Interest Law Program Director, and Dean Robert Reinstein. Without the support of these Temple University Beasley School of Law professionals, the mock trial program would not be the success it is today.

We use the occasion of the 2001 competition to honor W. Adrian Boyle, a long time supporter of the statewide mock trial program, whose passing leaves a void in the many lives he touched.



11. Chris Bushing picked up the loaded weapon and pointed it in the direction of Terry Gorey.

12. Chris Bushing pulled the trigger, causing the weapon to discharge and a bullet to strike Terry Gorey in the upper right thigh.

### **COUNT I: NEGLIGENCE**

13. Plaintiff incorporates by reference all the allegations set forth in paragraphs 1 through 12 as though same were fully set forth at length herein.

14. As the owner of a dangerous firearm, Defendant had a duty to ensure that the firearm was safely stored in a reasonable manner so that children could not gain access to the firearm.

15. By keeping a loaded weapon in his/her home, Defendant failed to reasonably store the firearm in a safe manner.

16. By failing to keep a child safety lock on the new gun, Defendant failed to reasonably store the firearm in a safe manner.

17. By showing off his/her gun collection while intoxicated, and then failing to ensure that the firearm was safely returned to the locked gun cabinet and that the study was locked, Defendant failed to reasonably store the firearm in a safe manner.

18. Defendant failed to provide a safe environment in his/her home at the time s/he was entertaining guests that included children.

19. As a direct result of the negligence of Defendant in keeping his/her firearm out of the hands of children, Terry Gorey was shot and severely injured by Defendant's minor child.

20. As a result of Defendant's negligence and consequent shooting, Terry Gorey was forced to undergo two surgeries and painful rehabilitation to repair the damage to his/her leg.

21. As a proximate result of Defendant's negligence and consequent shooting, Plaintiff incurred financial expense in providing for the health care of his/her child. Plaintiff was also forced to take time off from work to care for Terry.

22. As a result of Defendant's negligence and consequent shooting, Terry Gorey endured emotional distress and physical pain, discomfort and suffering for a prolonged period of time.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff Georgie Gorey, parent and guardian of Terry Gorey, demands that judgment against Defendant Al Bushing in an amount in excess of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), as well as interest and costs of this action, be entered in his favor.

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**ANSWER TO THE COMPLAINT WITH NEW MATTER**

8. Admitted in part and denied in part. Defendant admits drinking alcohol at the barbecue, but denies that such consumption impaired the judgment of Defendant.

9. Admitted in part and denied in part. Defendant admits to leaving the room to address an emergency. By way of further response, Defendant had left Plaintiff in the room, had locked the door and had told Plaintiff that all Plaintiff needed to do was to close the door behind him/her to secure the room. Defendant also told Plaintiff to return the gun to the cabinet prior to leaving the room.

10. Admitted.

11. Denied. To the contrary, Chris Bushing did not point the gun at Terry Gorey, but was merely walking back in the direction of the gun cabinet, where Terry Gorey was standing.

12. Denied. To the contrary, Chris Bushing tripped and fell on the area rug located in the room where the guns are located, causing the gun to fire accidentally.

### COUNT I: NEGLIGENCE

13. Defendant incorporates his/her response to Paragraphs 1 through 12 of the Complaint as if fully set forth herein at length.

14. Denied as stated. This averment sets forth a legal conclusion to which no response is required.

15. Denied. Defendant left the firearm loaded, but had it locked in a cabinet and the cabinet was in a locked room. It was due to Plaintiff's failure to return the gun to the cabinet and to close the door behind him/her that access to the firearm by minors was allowed.

16. Denied. The firearm was just purchased at a gun show on April 15, 2000 and Defendant was going to obtain a safety lock the next day. In the interim, the gun was safely locked.

17. Denied. Defendant was not intoxicated and attributes the access of the gun to the Plaintiff's failure to observe and comply with Defendant's safety measures and instructions.

18. Denied. At the time the guests entered his/her residence, all firearms were secured behind locked doors.

19. Denied. The shooting occurred due to the negligence of the Plaintiff.

20. Admitted.

### NEW MATTER

24. Adult Plaintiff left the study where the guns are kept after the Defendant had left the room.

25. Adult Plaintiff failed to put the Colt back into the gun cabinet and failed to close the door behind him/her, even though s/he was told that the door would automatically lock. Adult Plaintiff knew that children were in the house.

26. Adult Plaintiff was intoxicated at the time s/he left the study.

27. The negligence of Adult Plaintiff was the direct and proximate cause of the shooting of Terry Gorey.

28. Adult Plaintiff was negligent in informing Terry Gorey where the key to the study was hidden.

WHEREFORE, Defendant requests that judgment be entered in its favor against Plaintiffs on Count I of the Complaint and that Defendant be awarded the costs of defending this action.

24. Admitted.

25. Denied. Defendant left Adult Plaintiff without any means of securing the Colt in the gun cabinet and failed to inform Adult Plaintiff that the door to the study would automatically lock when closed.

26. Denied. Adult Plaintiff consumed some alcohol during the day but was fully aware of his/her surroundings.

27. Denied. Defendant acted negligently by leaving a loaded weapon in his/her home with children present, by not purchasing a child safety lock for the weapon, by not securing the safeties on the weapon, and by leaving the gun in an easily accessible place.

28. Denied. Terry Gorey never used the key to enter the study or gain access to the firearms.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs request that judgment be entered in favor of Plaintiff against Defendant on Count I of the complaint.

**STIPULATED FACTS**

1. On April 15, 2000, at approximately 2:00 p.m., the Gorey family visited the home of the Bushing family to enjoy an outdoor barbecue in the Bushings' backyard.
2. Al and Pat Bushing own a gun collection.
3. On April 15, 2000, Al Bushing purchased a single action Colt revolver, but had not yet purchased a child safety lock for the weapon.
4. Al Bushing and Georgie Gorey had been drinking alcoholic beverages that afternoon and were left alone with the children at approximately 5:00 p.m. while their spouses went to the liquor store to purchase additional alcohol.
5. Al Bushing showed Georgie Gorey the newly purchased Colt revolver in the study of Al Bushing's home.
6. Al Bushing had been the one cooking that afternoon and had left food on the grill while showing the newly purchased Colt revolver to Georgie Gorey.
7. The food that was left on the grill began to burn, so Al Bushing left Georgie Gorey alone in the study where the Colt was kept and returned to the grill.
8. Georgie Gorey joined Al Bushing in the backyard shortly after Al Bushing left the study.
9. After eating some additional food, the children of Bushing and Gorey went inside the house.
10. Chris Bushing was the first of the two children to enter the Bushing residence.

11. Both Chris Bushing and Terry Gorey entered the study where the Bushings keep their gun collection.

12. The Colt revolver was fired while in the hands of Chris Bushing.

13. The bullet discharged from the Colt revolver struck Terry Gorey in the upper left thigh.

**EVIDENTIARY STIPULATIONS**

The parties have stipulated to the authenticity of the following items:

1. Map of the first floor of the Bushings' residence is a fair and accurate representation of the area.
2. The Colt Single Action Flattop Target Pistol was the weapon that was fired at the scene, causing injury to Terry Gorey.

The parties reserve the right to dispute any legal or factual conclusions based on these items and to make objections other than to authenticity.

## LAW OF NEW TEMPLE

### Standard of Proof

In New Temple, the burden of proof is on the plaintiff to show that the actions committed by the defendant were the proximate cause of harm to the plaintiff. In this case, the necessary burden of proof is a preponderance of the evidence and the plaintiff must prove that the defendant acted in a negligent manner and is therefore liable for the actions of himself/herself and/or the third party that committed the tort.

### Statutory Law

#### 5109. Liability of firearms ownership

(a) It is the duty of an adult person who owns a firearm to take all reasonable and necessary precautions to ensure that the condition in which a firearm is stored prevents any minor children from gaining access to the firearm. This duty includes keeping the firearm stored in a place that children may not easily access, such as a locked cabinet, a safe, etc., and keeping the firearm stored in such a manner that it is not in firing condition.

(b) An adult person who owns a firearm may be held liable for damages to a person who is injured by a minor child who used the firearm should it be found that the adult person was negligent in storing the firearm.

(c) It is a defense to a civil action if the owner of the firearm can prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the negligence of another individual, other than the minor child, in the handling of the firearm supercedes the negligence of the owner of the firearm.

(d) definitions:

(1) adult person: anyone over 18 years of age

(2) minor child: anyone under 14 years of age

(3) negligence: the failure to do something which a reasonable person, guided by those ordinary considerations which ordinarily regulate human affairs, would do, or the doing of something which a reasonable and prudent person would not do.

#### 5111. Mandatory Gun Locks

An adult person who owns a firearm must purchase a child safety lock for the firearm. Failure to do so will result in a maximum of a \$1,000 fine and/or thirty days (30) imprisonment in the county prison. Should an accident occur due to the lack of a child safety lock on the firearm, the owner of the firearm can be held both criminally and civilly liable. This law is to take effect on January 1, 2002. Adopted by the legislature on June 10, 2000.

### MEMORANDUM AND ORDER

This matter stems from a series of events that culminated on April 15, 2000, with the accidental shooting of the minor Terry Gorey, thirteen years old. The shooting occurred when a bullet was fired from a 1903 Colt Sgt.'s pistol, owned by Al Bushing and in the possession of Chris Bushing, Al Bushing's child. As a result of the incident, Georgie Gorey, parent and guardian of Terry Gorey, has filed a civil lawsuit against Al Bushing, alleging that Al Bushing was negligent in the manner in which s/he kept his/her firearm. This case will be governed by Section 5109 of the laws of New Temple County, also known as the Liability of Gun Ownership law. Plaintiff is seeking damages representing the pain and suffering of Terry Gorey, the amount of out of pocket medical expenses, and loss of earnings Plaintiff incurred for having to take leave to care for Terry.

Since the parties have consented to bifurcate the proceedings, our focus is limited to the question of liability. The question of damages will be addressed only upon the finding of liability. The Court is presently faced with a motion for summary judgment filed by the Defendant.

### SUMMARY JUDGMENT STANDARD

Summary judgment is a means available to litigants for prompt and expeditious disposition of a controversy without a trial when there is no dispute as to material facts, or if only a question of law is involved. Summary judgment may be granted when all the evidence submitted to the Court shows that there is no triable issue as to any material fact and that the moving party is entitled to a judgment as a matter of law. Here, Defendant contends that s/he was not negligent in the safety precautions used to store his/her firearms, but it was the negligence of Plaintiff that led to the shooting of Terry Gorey.

The issue before this Court on Defendant's motion for summary judgment is whether Defendant is not liable as a matter of law because Plaintiff was responsible for the breach of safety precautions to which Defendant normally adheres.

## ANALYSIS

Defendant argues that Plaintiff's actions explain why the area where the guns are kept in his/her home was no longer safe for minors. Defendant claims that, because Plaintiff was the last person in the room where the guns are stored, Plaintiff is a superceding cause of the injuries suffered by Terry Gorey. Defendant further claims that Plaintiff's actions and the actions of the Plaintiff's child created the dangerous situation that resulted in this unfortunate shooting. It is a viable defense that the actions of Plaintiff are the direct cause of the injuries to Terry Gorey, but it is a defense that must be made at trial. The facts of this case are not clear cut, as there are many inconsistencies in the statements of the witnesses. While it is understood that both sides have stipulated to the condition of the room prior to the entry of both Defendant and Plaintiff, it is not clear as to how the room subsequently became both open to and unsafe for children. Looking at just the issue of entry, it could be that Plaintiff did not close the door or it could be that Defendant's child unlocked the door. Once in the study, there are additional questions without clear answers as to how the gun came to be fired. These are questions of fact for the jury to decide.

Further the veracity of the witnesses is an issue for the jury. Each side has the obligation to elicit the testimony of each witness to establish who may be telling the truth. Both sides have evidence that tell a favorable story. The jury must decide who is telling the truth.

The burden of proof will be on Plaintiff at trial. The Plaintiff will have to prove that the negligence of Defendant led to the injuries suffered by Terry Gorey. The burden of proof is preponderance of the evidence. Defendant has available to him/her the defense that the negligent actions of Plaintiff or a third party led to the injuries that Terry Gorey sustained.

The purpose of summary judgment is to prevent unnecessary and frivolous trials from proceeding all the way to trial level and wasting this Court's time and the government's resources. This case does not appear to be frivolous or unnecessary. The truthfulness of the parties and witnesses involved is a matter that should be left for the jury. The jury must decide if the actions of Al Bushing caused the injury of Terry Gorey, or if the actions of Georgie Gorey caused Terry's injuries. Both sides will tell their side of the story and the truth will come out.

Plaintiff Witness: Statement of Terry Gorey

1 My name is Terry Gorey and I am 13 years old. I live at 742 Evergreen Terrace in  
2 Owlville. My family and I have lived there since I was 4. I go to New Temple Junior/Senior  
3 High School, where I am in 7<sup>th</sup> grade. Chris Bushing used to be one of my best friends, up until  
4 the day s/he shot me. We are in the same school, but we are no longer friends, and never speak  
5 to each other. We used to hang out together all the time. Chris can get under my skin sometimes,  
6 especially with the way s/he teases me, but we got along well. There were times that I felt  
7 pressured to do things because Chris wanted to, and that usually led us into trouble. A couple of  
8 times, Chief Lieberman stopped us. S/he would never warn or get angry with Chris, but, for  
9 some reason or another, s/he always came down on me. I think it was because s/he is such good  
10 friends with the Bushings. S/he never charged me with anything because I never really broke any  
11 laws, but s/he really liked to give me a hard time.

12 The Bushings and my parents are really good friends. That is, they were friends until  
13 recently. This shooting wrecked everything, and it is all Chris' fault.

14 Last April, my parents and I went to the Bushings' for a barbecue. Chris and I were  
15 pretty pumped because we liked hanging out, especially at Chris' house. Chris' parents have a  
16 lot of money, and Chris has the best video games. They also have a satellite dish, so we could  
17 always watch cool movies. Chris had just gotten the new video game system and a bunch of  
18 games. S/he had been telling me about it for a couple of days, but since we were both pretty busy  
19 with school and sports, I didn't get the chance to get over to his/her house to try it out. The day  
20 of the barbecue would be the first chance I got. We were both really looking forward to playing  
21 the new games because Chris usually buys sports games and they are more fun to play against  
22 another person.

23 My parents and I got to the Bushings' around 2:00 p.m. Everyone was looking forward to  
24 that day. Chris' parents and my parents enjoyed any time they could spend together. They had  
25 planned this barbecue a few weeks ahead of time because of how busy their schedules were. The  
26 Bushings were great cooks and my parents loved it whenever the Bushings were hosting a meal.  
27 We would always bring dessert or something and everyone always had a good time. Chris and I  
28 liked these dinners because our folks always get a bit loaded and they would ignore us, allowing  
29 us to do whatever we liked without interruption. Normally, Chris' parents are really strict about  
30 stuff, always checking on us to see what we were doing, what movies we were watching, and  
31 stuff like that. It seems as though whenever we started to have a good time, Chris' parents were  
32 around to make sure that we didn't get out of hand. That was the only thing I didn't like about  
33 hanging out at Chris' house. I wish they would have watched him/her a bit closer on the day of  
34 the barbecue. Maybe then I wouldn't have gotten shot.

35 We had been at the Bushings' for a couple of hours before our parents realized they  
36 wanted to drink some more. Usually, the Bushings had plenty of alcohol on hand, but for some  
37 reason or another they were running low that day. It could be that they were drinking more than  
38 they expected. I know that Georgie, my father/mother, had had a few drinks that day, as did  
39 Chris' father/mother, Al. After a couple of hours they decided they needed more alcohol, so our

1 other parents went to the store to get more, leaving Georgie and Al behind to cook the food and  
2 keep an eye on us.

3 There was plenty of food. A Bushing barbecue meant that there was always going to be  
4 food on the grill and tons of chips and dips on the porch. Chris and I had just finished playing  
5 some video games and decided that we were hungry, so we went out back as our parents were  
6 leaving for the store. Al and Georgie were talking and I heard Al ask Georgie if s/he wanted to  
7 see this new gun Al had bought earlier that morning. Chris' parents have a huge gun collection.  
8 Since they have a lot of money, they like to purchase all sorts of guns. They even belong to the  
9 local gun club. Chris and I were promised that when we were old enough they would teach us  
10 how to use the guns. Our parents would go hunting from time to time. My parents own a few  
11 guns, but not nearly as many as the Bushings. Our parents would always get excited about their  
12 hunting trips. They would get together for a weekend and head out to a cabin in the woods.  
13 Chris and I went with them a couple of times when we were old enough, but they never would let  
14 us fire the guns. It was more like a camping trip for me and Chris. We had fun, but after a while  
15 it gets kind of boring in the woods. Usually we just stay with family when our parents decide to  
16 take these trips. They promised us that when we were old enough to handle a gun, they would  
17 take us on a trip with them and allow us to hunt as well. That is never going to happen now.

18 Anyway, Al had been telling Georgie about this new gun that s/he had recently bought.  
19 S/he was dying to show it off. I heard my mother/father (Georgie) say that s/he didn't think it  
20 was a good idea to see it now because they had been drinking, but Al kept talking the gun up and  
21 eventually interested my mom/dad enough that s/he gave in and they went to see the gun. I knew  
22 they had been drinking all day, but I didn't worry about anything because I knew they knew how  
23 to handle themselves around guns. So they got up and went to the study where the Bushings  
24 keep their guns.

25 Chris and I hung out in the backyard for a while. Al had left some food on the grill and  
26 must have forgotten about it when s/he went to show the guns to my mother/father. I noticed that  
27 something was burning and called to him/her. Al came running out and took care of the food.  
28 S/he just managed to save the steaks, burgers and sausages that were just about burnt. About a  
29 minute or two after Al came back out, my mother/father came back out. They both had a fair bit  
30 to drink and they were really annoying Chris and I. They started getting on Chris and me about  
31 why we didn't take the meat off the grill when we saw it burning instead of calling to them. To  
32 be honest, I didn't want to take the food off the grill for fear that I might mess something up and  
33 have to hear about it later. Chris' parents are a bit picky. Chris and I ate some food and then  
34 Chris went inside to go to the bathroom. S/he came back out and got me a few minutes later and  
35 then led me into the house, to the study where the guns are kept. When we got to the room, the  
36 door was open. S/he said we should go in, but I didn't think it was a good idea. Chris started to  
37 make fun of me, so eventually I gave in and we went into the study.

38 Chris' parents had warned us both before that we were not allowed in this room unless we  
39 were with an adult. There was the one time when Chris and I were about 7 years old that we  
40 went into the study without a parent. Chris had found the keys to the room hidden in a secret  
41 place, so we opened the door and went in. My parents busted us and went crazy. S/he was so  
42 angry. We got into a lot of trouble and after things cooled down, I remembered how my parents  
43 pleaded with me to never go in there again without an adult. Now, the thought of going in there

1 without a parent is frightening. I wish I would have listened to them that day. I would rather  
2 have had Chris tease me about not going into the study instead of Chris shooting me.

3 Usually, the study was locked and the guns were kept in a cabinet. I guess, because our  
4 parents had just been in the room, they left the door open. I felt weird about going in there  
5 mainly because I don't like guns all that much. I was looking forward to learning how to use  
6 them but, until we were properly trained, I felt nervous around guns.

7 As we went into the study, I noticed that there was a gun sitting on the desk. I said to  
8 Chris that we should get out of there before we got caught, but s/he just started making fun of  
9 me. Then s/he noticed the gun sitting on the desk. S/he went over and grabbed it. I said that  
10 s/he should probably put it down before something happened. Chris really began teasing me,  
11 pointing the gun at me and stuff like that. I walked over to the cabinet to insist to Chris that s/he  
12 put the gun away. The next thing I know is that the gun in Chris' hand went off and I felt this  
13 incredible pain in the side of my left leg. I fell down and could feel the blood running down my  
14 leg. Both our parents came running and I remember a lot of screaming and yelling, but the pain  
15 was so bad I don't remember much. The next clear memory I have is being in the hospital,  
16 waking up after surgery and the doctor telling me I would be all right. I was in a lot of pain and  
17 the doctor told me I was going to have to walk with crutches for sometime. I eventually had to  
18 have another surgery and that summer was the worst summer of my life. I had to go through  
19 rehabilitation for six months, and it was very painful. The doctor said there shouldn't be any  
20 permanent damage, but I do have a couple of scars.

21 Since the accident, the Bushings and my parents don't talk anymore. Chris and I are no  
22 longer friends. If s/he had listened to me, this never would have happened. I really wished it  
23 wouldn't have, not so much because I was hurt, but because no one talks to anyone anymore. It  
24 is really sad because our families were so close.

Plaintiff Witness: Statement of Georgie Gorey

1 My name is Georgie Gorey and I am Terry Gorey's parent. We live at 742 Evergreen  
2 Terrace in Owlville. I am currently employed at the local nuclear power plant, where I am a  
3 nuclear safety inspector. My spouse Stacy is a real estate agent. This whole ordeal is really sad  
4 because it has cost us our friendship with the Bushings. Terry and Chris Bushing were very close  
5 friends. Chris' parents, Pat and Al, were also good friends of ours, prior to Chris shooting Terry.  
6 Since Terry's shooting, we have been unable to forgive Al for his/her recklessness in keeping a  
7 loaded gun in the house. After having to watch Terry suffer all summer and having to take  
8 him/her to the doctor, we could never forgive Al for the way s/he handles his/her guns.

9 Al and I were pretty good friends. We had known each other since college. Al has done  
10 really well for himself/herself. S/he is a very good lawyer with a successful practice. S/he even  
11 married a doctor, Pat. Pat is also another good person. They both deserve everything they have  
12 because both have worked really hard. If it weren't for this incident, I know we would all still be  
13 really good friends.

14 As long as I can remember, Al had a thing for guns. S/he loved hunting and target  
15 shooting, and was excellent at both. You could always count on Al to snag a deer every season  
16 and invite a few people over for venison dinner. I went hunting with him/her a couple of times. I  
17 was never a big gun nut, but Al showed me how to use a gun. S/he was normally very careful  
18 with guns, especially once s/he and Pat had Chris. This is why I was so shocked that Terry had  
19 been shot. I remember Al telling Chris and Terry about gun safety and how, when they got older,  
20 we would go on a hunting trip together. I thought this might be a nice idea someday, both  
21 families together on a hunting trip, spending some quality time in the woods, but that is a dream  
22 that will never be fulfilled.

23 It was not unusual for my family to go over to the Bushings' to spend some time with  
24 them. Al and I would sometimes go into the study and plan our hunting trips, and other  
25 activities. There were a couple of times that I saw Al leave the gun cabinet unlocked. I asked  
26 him/her if this happened often and s/he said that usually s/he locks the door and because s/he  
27 keeps the guns empty of ammunition. S/he said s/he wasn't too concerned because s/he had  
28 spoken to Chris before about the dangers of guns. I said that I didn't think this was a good idea  
29 because Chris wasn't the most responsible kid and was known to get into a bit of trouble from  
30 time to time. Still, Al didn't seem too concerned, which surprised me a bit because they were  
31 always looking over the shoulders of the kids whenever Terry was over.

32 There was another time, long ago, when the kids were little, maybe seven or eight years  
33 old, when our families were together at the Bushings' and the kids got into the study. Al or Pat  
34 must not have locked the door. To make matters worse, it was one of the occasions when Al left  
35 the gun cabinet unlocked. I was so angry when I saw Chris and Terry in that room, the two of  
36 them opening the gun cabinet. I went crazy and Al and I got into a big argument because I told  
37 him/her something really bad might happen. I didn't know then that I would be a prophet. Al  
38 swore s/he had locked the study door. In fact, s/he claimed that Chris said Terry had taken the  
39 keys and opened the doors. I found this difficult to believe because I warned Terry a number of



1 times about going into that study without an adult present. I also told him/her about how  
2 dangerous guns are and that s/he should not use one until Al properly instructed him/her on how  
3 to use one. Stacy and I had a really long talk with Terry after that incident and I though we  
4 scared him/her pretty well. I didn't want to scare him/her, but I didn't know any other way to  
5 make sure that s/he would not go into the study without an adult. S/he promised me s/he would  
6 never go into that room without an adult. I wish s/he had kept that promise.

7 The Bushings invited us over for a barbecue last April. It was Saturday, April 15<sup>th</sup> and  
8 the barbecue was in celebration of tax day. Everyone was looking forward to it because we all  
9 enjoyed each others' company. Al and I had been friends for years, so naturally our spouses got  
10 to be real close. Our kids grew up together and loved to play together. They were more like  
11 siblings than they were friends. So, when the day for the barbecue came, we were all in a good  
12 mood. We knew that we would have fun and that we would get a great meal. Al is a fantastic  
13 cook, and barbecuing is his/her specialty. Summer was always fun because the Bushings would  
14 have a number of barbecues and would always invite us over. It was rare that we ever turned  
15 them down.

16 We always took something over to the Bushings' when they invited us for a meal. This  
17 time we took over some beer and some dessert. I figured we would drink some that day, but not  
18 as much as we did, otherwise I would have brought more beer with me. We got to the Bushings'  
19 around 2 p.m. It was the perfect day for a barbecue. It was cool and the sun was shining. The  
20 Bushings have a screened in area in their backyard so that they and their guests could sit inside of  
21 it while eating without being attacked or pestered by bugs. They had a mini-fridge and some  
22 furniture in there, so that it was like being in a room in their house. We went right out there as  
23 soon as we arrived. Al was getting the barbecue ready. S/he was running a bit late because s/he  
24 had been at the gun club earlier that morning and had gotten back later than s/he wanted.

25 It must have been around 5 p.m. or so when we realized that we needed more beer. Al  
26 and I had drunk the most, so Stacy and Pat went to go get more beer. Besides, Al was the grill  
27 master that day and s/he couldn't leave. Like I said, Al was really a great cook and when s/he  
28 barbecued, it was an all day event. There was always food on the grill, and chips and dips were  
29 everywhere. The Bushings would force food on you because they hated leftovers. You usually  
30 had to be rolled out of their house.

31 Stacy and Pat left for the store and the kids were inside. They came out right after Stacy  
32 and Pat left because they wanted some more food. Those two kids can really eat. Al threw some  
33 more food on the grill. We began talking about guns, and s/he was telling me about the new gun  
34 s/he had just purchased. It was a single action Colt revolver s/he had purchased that morning at  
35 this small gun show the local gun club sponsored.

36 Al was dying to show the gun off. S/he is one of those people that likes to show others  
37 the things that s/he can purchase. S/he didn't have a lot as a kid and now that s/he can afford  
38 most anything s/he wants, s/he likes others to know. I must admit that I had an interest in this  
39 gun, but I told Al that it was probably a bad idea to show it to me now because the kids were  
40 around and we had been drinking. Still s/he was insistent upon showing me the gun. I tried to  
41 talk him/her out of showing me the gun at that moment, but I couldn't talk any sense into  
42 him/her. Al tends to get like that when drinking. And it certainly doesn't help that s/he's a  
43 lawyer. I have never known a lawyer who is willing to admit that they are wrong, at least without

1 a long, drawn out argument. Even when Al is wrong, I have the hardest time convincing  
2 him/her. Finally I gave in and agreed to see the gun.

3 We went to the room where all the guns were kept and Al unlocked the door. I was  
4 surprised when s/he didn't take the key from the plant, but had one on him/her. Al told me that  
5 they kept a spare key hidden in one of the plants in the living room, so that Chris would not be  
6 able to find it. I always thought it was funny that s/he kept the key in the plant. Stacy and Terry  
7 also got a kick out of it. We all thought it was just such a weird hiding place. Turns out that Al  
8 had to have another copy made because s/he forgot that s/he hid the key in the plant. When I  
9 heard this, I really lost it. I couldn't wait to tell Terry and Stacy when we got home.

10 As soon as Al opened the door to the study s/he went straight to the gun cabinet and  
11 pulled out the Colt. I didn't see him/her unlock the door to the cabinet, so I assumed it wasn't  
12 locked. S/he had just got the Colt that morning and I noticed that the safety trigger lock was  
13 missing on the gun. I asked Al why s/he hadn't bought one yet and s/he said that s/he didn't have  
14 the time. I reminded him/her that s/he had better get one soon, not only for the safety of Chris,  
15 but because a law was going to go into effect in 2002 that required child safety locks on all guns.  
16 As we were looking at the gun the kids started to yell that the food was burning. Al took off and  
17 ran over to the barbecue leaving the gun on the desk in the study. Since I had already seen the  
18 gun collection and had been looking at this gun for a few minutes, I decided that I would leave.  
19 Al took the keys with him/her when s/he left to take care of the food, so I couldn't lock up  
20 anything. I put the gun back in the cabinet and closed the cabinet door. When I left the study, I  
21 closed the door and went back outside. I don't remember Al ever telling me to lock up or that the  
22 door was locked so all I had to do was shut it. With all that s/he had to drink that day I think s/he  
23 may be wrong in thinking that s/he told me to lock up. Al doesn't drink much, so s/he tends to  
24 get drunk pretty easily. S/he is not known for handling his/her alcohol.

25 I went to the backyard and Al and I had some more beer and some more food. The kids  
26 ate some food and then went back inside to play. A few minutes later I heard a gunshot and then  
27 a lot of screaming. Both Al and I ran into the house to see what had happened and there was  
28 Terry lying on the floor, bleeding from his/her leg and hysterical. Chris seemed to be in shock  
29 and was crying about how sorry s/he was and was saying that it was just an accident, s/he didn't  
30 meant it. I couldn't believe that Terry had been shot. I started to get real upset and was trying to  
31 calm Terry down, but because I was so upset, that didn't work so well. Al was doing everything  
32 s/he could to help, but I really didn't want his/her help. I figured s/he had already done enough  
33 damage, and I didn't want him/her anywhere near my child. Al called the police and I took Terry  
34 to the hospital. I knew that if we waited for the ambulance it would take longer, so I didn't  
35 bother to wait.

36 They took Terry right away and s/he went right into surgery. Stacy came as soon as s/he  
37 got back. Al and Pat also came later on, but we told them they should leave. I was so angry with  
38 Al for keeping the gun loaded and for not having a lock on the gun. I told him/her something  
39 like this would happen.

40 Fortunately Terry came out of the surgery and things went well. S/he had to have a  
41 couple of surgeries, but s/he is going to be all right. It was a rough couple of months for him/her.  
42 Other surgeries were needed to repair muscle damage. The doctor said it was a good thing that  
43 Terry was young because if this had been an older person, they may have a limp for the rest of

1 their lives. Terry spent the whole summer visiting doctors and rehabilitating the leg. It was hard  
2 for all of us, but especially hard for Terry. The poor kid lost the whole summer because of the  
3 Bushings' ignorance. All the things s/he missed out on and the embarrassment and humiliation  
4 s/he had to suffer was heartbreaking. I don't think I will ever be able to forgive Al for what my  
5 child had to go through.

Plaintiff Witness: Statement of Danny Cheney

1 My name is Danny Cheney and I recently retired from the New Temple County police  
2 force. Prior to my retirement, I worked for the police department for over 15 years. I left  
3 because I did not receive the promotion that I deserved. I had been sergeant for a number of  
4 years, but was passed over so that Joey Lieberman could be promoted. Joey's a good cop, but I  
5 was with the force longer and had better credentials. I think Joey got the promotion because s/he  
6 gets along better with the politicians and other officials, but, if you were to talk to other cops, you  
7 would know that Joey is not the best cop, and certainly shouldn't be chief.

8 I graduated from New Temple University ten years ago with a degree in psychology and a  
9 minor in criminal justice. I have taken outside courses in forensics and investigatory procedure,  
10 which were paid for by the department, so that I may apply these skills to my present job. I have  
11 a good relationship with the coroner's office and other forensic labs in the area and, I believe, as  
12 my record indicates, that I was a fairly competent investigator and police sergeant.

13 I was on duty on April 15, 2000 when I heard a call come over the radio that there had  
14 been an accidental shooting over on Greenwood Place. I knew another Sgt. might be on the  
15 scene because it was not unusual for other officers to be nearby. I was riding solo that day, as  
16 was Capt. Lieberman. It is not unusual for officers to ride solo, but we usually have at least two  
17 officers on the scene of any call. I knew Capt., then Sgt., Lieberman, would probably be on the  
18 scene because s/he was riding alone and usually patrolled that area of the town.

19 When I arrived on the scene Joey was already there, as expected. Sgt. Lieberman, who  
20 had a better idea of the situation because s/he had arrived first, briefed me. S/he told me that the  
21 shooting victim, Terry Gorey, had been taken to the hospital by his/her parent Georgie Gorey.  
22 When I asked why this was, Sgt. Lieberman told me that because they felt waiting for an  
23 ambulance to come pick up the victim to transport him/her to the hospital would have taken too  
24 long. Frankly, I agreed. The hospital is very close to the Bushing residence and the ambulance  
25 would have taken longer to get Terry to the hospital. Sgt. Lieberman and I then decided to  
26 conduct our investigation.

27 We entered the Bushing residence and questioned Al Bushing. Al told us that s/he had  
28 just purchased a pistol that morning and did not have the opportunity to buy a safety lock for it  
29 yet. Al also told us that s/he had left the gun loaded that day because s/he had been at the range  
30 earlier in the day and did not have the opportunity to unload the weapon because s/he had a lot of  
31 things to do around the house before s barbecue they were having. Mr./Mrs. Bushing told us that  
32 s/he had locked the gun in the cabinet in a room that is always locked, but had shown the gun  
33 later in the afternoon to Georgie Gorey. S/he then told us that s/he left Gorey in the room alone  
34 and asked him/her to lock the gun and room up when s/he left the room, which Bushing claims  
35 Gorey failed to do.

36 Next, we interviewed Chris Bushing, the person accused of shooting Terry Gorey. Chris  
37 told us that the gun fired accidentally when s/he tripped on the area rug in the room. Chris said  
38 that when Terry and s/he had gone back in the house, Terry saw that the room where the guns  
39 were kept was open and wanted to go in. They went in and Terry picked up the gun and was  
40 pointing it at Chris, which Chris did not like. When Terry realized the gun cabinet was opened,

1 s/he put the gun down, at which point Chris claims s/he picked up the gun to return it to the  
2 cabinet, when s/he tripped and fell and the gun fired, hitting Terry in the upper right thigh.

3 I then did my own investigation of the scene. I noticed the area rug in the middle of the  
4 floor of the room and measured off the distance from the point where the gun fired to where  
5 Terry had been struck. I also noted the bloodstains on the floor. I drew a sketch of the room and  
6 have marked off the points at which the event took place. The police have adopted this sketch as  
7 accurate.

8 I spoke with Sgt. Lieberman after investigating the scene and s/he seemed to think that  
9 this was an accident and that no criminal charges would be pressed. I did not want to rule  
10 anything out at this point. Besides, I think that Sgt. Lieberman, who is friends with Al Bushing  
11 and an avid gun nut, was siding with Al Bushing because of their relationship. I wasn't  
12 convinced that the answers were that simple. I had a hard time believing everything Chris said  
13 because there have been a few instances in which I have had to speak with Chris about some of  
14 his/her actions in the neighborhood. It was stuff like toilet papering a house, soaping cars, etc.,  
15 stuff young people sometimes do. I did catch him/her lying one time about his/her involvement  
16 in a situation. I asked him/her if s/he was involved in the egging of a student and s/he told me  
17 no. I found the other students who were involved and they confessed to being involved when  
18 approached. They also told me that Chris was involved, so I went back and spoke with Chris  
19 again. When I told him/her that I had witnessed his/her involvement, s/he finally confessed. I  
20 really wanted to charge him/her with mischief, but I knew it would never stick because of who  
21 his/her parents were and who they know. Because of this experience, I was very reluctant to  
22 believe the Bushings' story. This is why I continued to investigate.

23 The next day I went to the hospital and spoke with Terry and Georgie Gorey. Georgie is a  
24 good friend of mine. We belong to a bowling league that meets on Wednesday nights. I know  
25 Georgie is a good person and have no reason to doubt anything s/he tells me. Georgie and Terry  
26 told their side of the story. Georgie told me how s/he could not lock the guns up because the  
27 cabinet needed to be locked with a key and how s/he thought that s/he had closed the door behind  
28 him/her. Terry told me how Chris had been the first to enter the house to use the bathroom and  
29 then had come back out and invited Terry into the house. When they got into the house they  
30 were heading over to Chris' room when Chris found that the door to the study was open. Terry  
31 said s/he did not want to go in because s/he had been caught in there before and s/he knew his/her  
32 parents did not want him/her to go in their without parental guidance. S/he said when they went  
33 in there Chris found the gun and was pointing it at Terry. Terry then walked over to the gun  
34 cabinet to insist that Chris put the gun away when Chris pulled the trigger and the bullet struck  
35 Terry in the side of the left leg. S/he also told me that Chris did not trip on the rug. When I  
36 asked Terry if s/he thought that Chris knew the gun was loaded s/he said that didn't know, but  
37 doubted that Chris would have played around like that had s/he known the gun was loaded.

38 I spoke with the doctor that treated Terry at the hospital. He told me that he had spoke  
39 with Sgt. Lieberman and told him/her that the wounds were consistent with Chris Bushing's  
40 story. I then asked the doctor if it was possible that the person had taken aim at Terry, he said  
41 that he could not rule that out. He told me the angle the bullet entered into Terry's leg was a  
42 downward trajectory. The doctor also told me that he was not a forensic expert. When I heard  
43 how the bullet entered Terry's leg I was convinced that Chris had intentionally fired the gun. If,

1 as Chris said, the gun fired accidentally after s/he tripped, the bullet would have entered in a  
2 straight line or at an upward angle because Chris would have been lower to the ground.

1 I wrote up my report and asked the Goreys if they wanted to press charges. They said  
2 they didn't want to hurt the Bushings criminally, but would seek a civil action. Since they did  
3 not want to press charges, we decided not to pursue the matter further.

4 I wish the Goreys had pressed charges just to teach these gun owners a lesson. People  
5 should not be allowed to carry guns, period. There are way too many accidents and criminals  
6 have such easy access to weapons, which only hurts the public.

Defense Witness: Statement of Chris Bushing

1 My name is Chris Bushing and I am 13 years old. I live at 2408 Greenwood Place in  
2 Owlville with my parents Pat and Al Bushing. I am in seventh grade at Owlville Junior/Senior  
3 High School. I am on the honor roll at school and I am in the gifted program. Terry and I used  
4 to be best friends until this unfortunate accident happened. Since s/he was shot, we have not  
5 really been friends. S/he blames me for the whole thing, but that is not the truth. I don't know  
6 why s/he is lying the way s/he is, but it has caused me to not want to be his/her friend. The  
7 shooting was a complete accident, and I never meant to hurt Terry, but s/he makes it sound worse  
8 than it really is. My parents said Terry is acting this way because Terry's parents want the money  
9 and my parents earn a good living.

10 Terry and I were good friends for a long time, but we did argue from time to time because  
11 Terry likes to pick fights with me and lie and get me in trouble for things s/he did. One time in  
12 school Terry and I were in the hallway together and Terry pulled the fire alarm. S/he had already  
13 been in trouble once before and if s/he was caught this time s/he would have been suspended.  
14 Someone must have seen us in the hallway and told a teacher because we got busted. When we  
15 got called into the office, Terry told the principal I did it, which I didn't. I didn't fight too hard  
16 because I knew the principal would not punish me as severely as he would Terry. I got detention  
17 for a week, but Terry didn't get suspended. I was real angry at first, but realized it might not  
18 have been the worst thing to do. After all, Terry and I were like siblings.

19 My parents decided to have a barbecue last April in honor of tax day, and because we are  
20 such good friends with the Goreys, they invited them over. My parents and Terry's parents have  
21 always been pretty good friends, at least before the accident happened. My mom/dad and Terry's  
22 mom/dad knew each other before they got married and were friends all the way up to the time of  
23 the accident. My parents and Terry's parents used to go on hunting trips together and were  
24 always talking about how they were going to take us on a trip when we were old enough. My  
25 parents told me that I was too young to handle a gun, but when I turned 16 they were going to  
26 teach me how to handle a gun. I knew all about gun safety since my parents kept the guns in the  
27 house. I never went into the room alone where the guns were kept because I was always told not  
28 to after a little incident involving Terry and me when we were eight years old. My parents had  
29 talked to me about how dangerous guns can be and how a person must take precautions around  
30 guns. They told me that they always kept the guns unloaded so that accidents were less likely to  
31 happen. I have to admit that I was really interested in learning how to use a gun, but sometimes  
32 the things my parents taught me scared me. I was afraid that I might get hurt or that someone  
33 else would. But I knew that my parents were very good with guns and was looking forward to  
34 the day that I could be as responsible as they were so that I could get to fire a gun.

35 The barbecue was on April 15<sup>th</sup>, 2000. Terry and I were excited because we knew that we  
36 would get to hang out all day. I had just got a new video game and I couldn't wait for Terry to  
37 come over so that we could try it out. Besides, I loved it when my parents would barbecue. My  
38 mom/dad is a real good cook and when we would barbecue s/he would make some great food,  
39 especially because s/he was always trying to impress people.

40 As soon as the Goreys arrived, Terry and I went to go try out the new video game. We  
41 played for a couple of hours while our parents sat out in the backyard and ate and drank.

1 Occasionally, Terry and I would go out back and grab something to eat. Eventually we got bored  
2 with the game and we went in the backyard to hang out for a bit.

3 It was pretty obvious that my mom/dad (Al) had been drinking, but it was even more  
4 obvious that Terry's mom/dad (Georgie) had been drinking. Whenever the two of them were  
5 around each other and they had alcohol, they drank a lot, especially Mr./Mrs. Gorey. I can  
6 remember the one time Mr./Mrs. Gorey drank so much that s/he passed out at our house and we  
7 had to let him/her sleep over. S/he was sick all night and all morning. It wasn't unusual for  
8 him/her to get really drunk. That is why Mr./Mrs. Gorey (Stacy) didn't really drink that much.  
9 Someone had to be able to drive home and take care of Terry. Sometimes Mr./Mrs. Gorey  
10 (Georgie) would say mean things when drunk and our parents would fight, but they would always  
11 patch things up.

12 When we went out back, our parents (Stacy and Pat) went to go get more alcohol. After  
13 they left, my mom/dad and Mr./Mrs. Gorey went into the house. I heard Georgie say something  
14 about wanting to see the new gun my mom/dad had just bought off the internet. My parents are  
15 very proud of their gun collection, so when Mr./Mrs. Gorey asked to see the new gun, of course  
16 my mom/dad is going to show it to them. The two of them got up and went to look at the new  
17 gun.

18 Terry also heard the conversation between our parents and was curious to see this gun  
19 that a general once owned. We were talking about it for a little while, when I noticed that there  
20 was a lot of smoke and some flames shooting up from the barbecue. Terry called to my  
21 mom/dad and told him that something was burning. My mom/dad came running out and took  
22 care of everything. S/he managed to save the food. It is very rare that my mom/dad messes up a  
23 barbecue, so that is another indication he had been drinking. My mom/dad eventually got the  
24 food under control and a few minutes later Mr./Mrs. Gorey came back outside. We ate some food  
25 and then Terry wanted to go inside and hang out for a bit, so we went back in. I had run ahead of  
26 Terry to go to the bathroom. I turned around when I got back to my room and noticed Terry had  
27 not followed me. I don't know why s/he didn't, so I waited for a couple of seconds and then s/he  
28 came strolling in. We started to walk towards my room to decide what to do. Terry told me the  
29 door to the study was open. I think s/he opened it because I saw the key that my parents had  
30 hidden lying on the floor. Terry is much more adventurous than I am and I knew that s/he would  
31 want to go into the room to see the new gun, especially after hearing our parents talk about it.  
32 Terry said we should go into the study. I really didn't want to, but for some reason I gave in. We  
33 went in and there on the desk was the new gun my mom/dad had just bought. Terry was  
34 immediately drawn to it. I didn't think it was a good idea to be holding the gun, so I told Terry to  
35 put it down. Terry started to make fun of me and stuff, but eventually put the gun down because  
36 s/he noticed that the gun cabinet was opened. So s/he went to go grab some other guns. I picked  
37 up the new gun and was going to put it back in the cabinet and was telling Terry to stay away  
38 from the cabinet when I tripped on the area rug on the floor. When I fell, the gun went off and  
39 the next thing I know Terry is lying on the floor screaming. S/he had been shot in the side of  
40 his/her left leg. I felt horrible. I was hysterical. Our parents came running into the room and  
41 Mr./Mrs. Gorey started saying some pretty nasty things to my mom/dad. Basically, s/he blamed  
42 my mom/dad for the whole thing because there was no lock on the gun and because the door was  
43 unlocked. My mom/dad said it wasn't his/her fault because Mr./Mrs. Gorey was the last one out



1 of the room and all s/he had to do was to close the door behind him/her. My mom/dad realized  
2 this wasn't the time to fight, so s/he called the cops and was about to call the ambulance when  
3 Mr./Mrs. Gorey just picked Terry up and took him/her to the hospital. S/he thought that would  
4 be faster seeing how the hospital was only 10 minutes away. S/he thought it would take longer if  
5 they had to wait for an ambulance.

6 My mom/dad tried to calm me down, but I was way too upset. I told him/her what had  
7 happened, and s/he said it wasn't my fault. But s/he did say that I shouldn't have been in the  
8 room and that I know better than to pick up guns. S/he was right.

1 When my mom/dad and Mr./Mrs. Gorey returned from the store, my mom/dad told them  
2 what happened. Mr./Mrs. Gorey went over to the hospital. We had to stay behind to talk to the  
3 police, but left for the hospital right after they finished talking to us. This is something that I  
4 didn't want to do because Sgt. Cheney doesn't like me. There was this one time s/he thought that  
5 I was involved in the egging of another New Temple student, but I told him/her that I wasn't  
6 involved. The people who did the egging were caught and were punished. After they were  
7 caught, Sgt. Cheney came back to talk to me and told me that s/he had witnesses that said I was  
8 involved. I kept telling him/her that I didn't do it, but s/he didn't want to hear it. Eventually I  
9 just told him/her that I did it because I knew I would never get left alone if I stuck to my story.  
10 Nothing really came of it, but I knew that Sgt. Cheney really didn't like me.

11 We left for the hospital when Sgt. Cheney finished having fun with me. By the time we  
12 got there they had already taken Terry into surgery. The Goreys were real upset and started  
13 getting really nasty with my parents. I knew from the tone of the argument this was pretty  
14 serious and that they would probably not be friends anymore. Unfortunately I was right. Terry  
15 and I don't talk anymore either. I wish this whole thing never had happened. I wish I never had  
16 gone into that room with Terry. I never want to be around guns again.

Defense Witness: Statement of Al Bushing

1 My name is Al Bushing and I live at 2408 Greenwood Place, in Owlville. I am married to  
2 Pat Bushing. We have one child, Chris. I am a practicing attorney. The Gorey family and my  
3 family used to be very close, until Terry was accidentally shot. Georgie and I went to college  
4 together and had remained the best of friends until this most unfortunate turn of events. I miss  
5 his/her friendship. Our families knew each other well and our children grew up together. It  
6 really is a shame about what happened, but it really wasn't my fault. I would do anything to make  
7 the situation right again so that we could be friends again, but I am afraid that there is nothing  
8 more that I can do. The Goreys bringing this lawsuit against us just proves to me that they are  
9 unable to get over this accident and forgive us. And since I am not one to beg, I will have to live  
10 with the decision they have made.

11 My spouse and I are avid gun collectors. We both had guns before we were married and  
12 now that we are both successful professionals, we have the ability to purchase guns that we have  
13 always wanted to own. I make no apologies for living the good life; both Pat and I have worked  
14 hard for what we have and we enjoy our lifestyle.

15 Both Pat and I know how to handle guns. We belong to the Owlville gun club and read  
16 and take classes on gun safety. We both belong to the NRA and are staunch believers in the  
17 Second Amendment of the United States Constitution. We have taught Chris and Terry about  
18 gun safety and have taken most every precaution we know of to ensure that the children were  
19 safe. Both Chris and Terry know better than to enter the room where the guns are kept without  
20 adult supervision. They also know better than to handle a weapon without any adult supervision.  
21 I must admit that I am disappointed in both of them for ever entering that room, and even more  
22 disappointed that they chose to pick up the firearms. But these things happen, which is why Pat  
23 and I have taken precautions such as child locks on the guns and keeping the guns in a safe  
24 condition, i.e., without any bullets in them. In fact, I had planned on getting a child safety lock  
25 on the gun just before the barbecue. I know the legislature just passed a law that makes these  
26 locks mandatory, but it won't affect me much because I have been putting safety locks on my  
27 guns as far back as I can remember. I was unable to get the safety locks right away because my  
28 schedule is so hectic. I am a practicing attorney, with my own successful firm and it is not  
29 unusual for me to be called away because one of my clients needs legal counsel. Since my firm  
30 has started to take off, I have expanded and have taken on two new partners. I am hoping that  
31 things will settle down for me a bit now.

32 The reason the gun was loaded was because I had just gone to the gun club that morning  
33 and purchased it. The club was sponsoring a gun show and I saw this colt single shot revolver  
34 for sale, and I knew I had to have it. It was a bit pricey, but that is because it is so old and in such  
35 good condition. I wanted to test it out and see what type of action it had. The guy I bought it off  
36 of told me that the gun was in near perfect firing condition, even though the outside of the gun  
37 had faded and looked a bit discolored. He explained to me that this happens with these guns  
38 because they are so old. He also told me that the original owner lived near the beach, so the  
39 oxidation process occurred at a higher rate. I wanted to make sure that I was not getting  
40 bamboozled, so I fired a couple of shots to make sure it was in good firing condition. The gun  
41 handled magnificently, so I fired a couple of rounds. I don't know what happened to all the time

1 I thought I had that morning, but I soon realized that I had to get back in order to prepare for the  
2 barbecue. Usually, I buy the child safety lock as soon as I purchase a firearm, but the club didn't  
3 have any that day and I couldn't buy any on Sunday because the stores are closed, so I knew it  
4 would have to wait until Monday. I returned from the range about one hour before the Goreys  
5 were due to arrive, and I forgot to unload the gun because I had a lot of prep work to do for the  
6 barbecue. I locked the gun in the cabinet and then locked the door. I thought it would be safe to  
7 leave the gun loaded just for the day. I guess I was wrong.

8 The Goreys arrived at about 2 p.m. All the adults went out back to our screened in area  
9 so that we could talk and I could barbecue. The Goreys brought a few beers, which wasn't  
10 unusual for them to do. Whenever we invited them over for a meal, they usually brought some  
11 type of alcoholic beverage and dessert. Sometimes I wished they hadn't because Georgie had a  
12 tendency to drink too much and cause some problems. I worry about Georgie and still do. I  
13 think s/he has a drinking problem and is afraid to realize it. It's a shame too, because Georgie is  
14 a really intelligent person and there is no telling what s/he may be able to do if s/he stopped  
15 drinking.

16 Since I do drink from time to time, just not to the degree that Georgie does, I figured the  
17 barbecue was a good time to drink. Our spouses don't drink much, especially Stacy because s/he  
18 always has to wind up taking care of Georgie by the end of an evening. Usually Pat or myself  
19 will keep pace with Stacy so s/he doesn't feel alone or left out. That day Pat didn't really feel like  
20 drinking too much anyway. They had a couple of beers between them, but Georgie and I did a  
21 majority of the drinking.

22 The day was going fine and everyone was having a good time. The kids were playing  
23 inside the house and were very well behaved. They ate with us and would occasionally come  
24 outside for more food when they were hungry. I think that Terry and Chris were good for each  
25 other. There was a friendly competition between the two and they kept each other in line. I  
26 know for a fact that there were times when Chris would protect Terry from getting in trouble, like  
27 the one time that Terry pulled the fire alarm at school and because Chris knew that Terry would  
28 get suspended or expelled from school, Chris took the blame. I found this out when the kids  
29 were talking about it one day. I was walking by Chris' room and heard them talking about it. I  
30 couldn't believe my ears, so I went in and found out the real story. Terry really owed Chris for  
31 saving him/her that time.

32 The afternoon was a lot of fun. By the time early evening was approaching, we noticed  
33 that the supply of beer was getting low. Georgie wanted to keep drinking and I figured, what the  
34 heck, I haven't had this good a time for a while; I might as well keep on going. Pat and Stacy  
35 decided they would get more beer for us because neither Georgie nor I was in a position to drive  
36 without risking our lives or the lives of other motorists. They also decided they were going to  
37 pick up something at the mall and maybe more dessert. They said they would be back in a little  
38 while.

39 After they left, Georgie and I sat around talking and reminiscing. It was a lot of fun. We  
40 had enough beer to last until our spouses returned, and the kids were behaving in the house. I  
41 decided to throw some more food on the grill figuring that Georgie and I would have some more.  
42 As soon as I lifted the lid, Chris shouted out to throw some more on the grill for s/he and Terry.  
43 While I was doing this, Georgie and I were talking about my gun collection. I told him/her about

1 the gun I had just purchased and Georgie was really curious to see it. I love to show the guns to  
2 people, but I didn't think it would be such a good idea to show it to Georgie on that day because  
3 we had been drinking and I was in the middle of grilling food. Besides, I knew the gun wasn't in  
4 the safest condition, and I felt better leaving it locked in the cabinet. Georgie kept on cajoling me  
5 and I eventually gave in just to get him/her to leave me alone.

6 When we got to the study, I unlocked the door. We both entered the room and I took  
7 Georgie over to the cabinet. I pointed the new gun out to him/her. S/he said that s/he wanted to  
8 get a closer look and I told him that I hadn't had the chance to unload the gun, that s/he should be  
9 careful. I figured that while I had the gun out now I could unload it. I unlocked the cabinet and  
10 gave the gun to Georgie. Georgie said it was a great gun, not so much because it is anything  
11 special itself, but because of the history behind it. I was about to take the bullets out of the gun,  
12 when I heard the kids screaming about the food on the grill burning. I told Georgie to lock the  
13 gun up and close the door to the room, that the door was locked and if s/he just closed it that no  
14 one could get in. I know s/he couldn't lock the cabinet, but I figured if s/he at least put the gun in  
15 the cabinet and then closed the cabinet door, it would appear to be locked. I also knew that the  
16 door to the room was locked and all Georgie had to do was close it all the way behind him/her on  
17 the way out. Apparently s/he didn't close the door when s/he left, nor did s/he put the gun back  
18 in the cabinet. It wasn't that it was too much to do, although you could never be too sure with  
19 Georgie.

20 I ran out to the backyard and took care of the food. I was able to salvage it from the  
21 flames and it was still edible. It certainly wasn't the best food I ever prepared, but it wasn't the  
22 worst either.

23 A few minutes after I had left him/her alone in the room with the gun, Georgie came back  
24 outside and we had something to eat and were talking. The kids ate a little something and then  
25 went back inside. I asked Georgie if s/he locked the cabinet door and the room, and s/he told me  
26 that s/he closed the door only because she didn't have the key. I told Georgie where I kept the  
27 key. S/he knew that I moved it around so that Chris wouldn't find it. I had told him/her a few  
28 days ago that I had hid the key in one of the plants in the living room. While I was telling  
29 Georgie that s/he should have taken the key and locked up, I heard a gunshot and a scream.  
30 Georgie and I jumped up and ran into the house. When we got to the room with all the guns I  
31 saw Terry on the floor with a bullet wound in the side of his/her left leg and s/he was bleeding  
32 pretty badly. Chris was hysterical and the gun was on the floor. Georgie ran right over to Terry  
33 and I tried to calm Chris down. You really couldn't talk to either of the kids because they were so  
34 hysterical they weren't making any sense. I was going to call an ambulance, but Georgie snapped  
35 that it would be quicker for him/her to take Terry to the hospital. S/he may have been right  
36 because the hospital is very close and if we had to wait for the ambulance instead of just taking  
37 Terry, we could have waited a long time. I was trying to help, but Georgie kept snapping back at  
38 me, saying I had done enough already. I didn't want to get into an argument with him/her in this  
39 situation, but s/he was way out of line and I told him/her that when things settled down. I did  
40 call the police before Georgie left.

41 After Georgie left, I sat down and Chris and s/he told me the story. The police showed up  
42 and we told them what happened. As we were talking to the police, Pat and Stacy returned. I  
43 explained what happened to them, and Stacy wanted to get to the hospital immediately. Pat took

1 Stacy over since Georgie had taken their car. The police conducted their investigation and then  
2 Chris and I went to the hospital to catch up with the Goreys and Pat. Stacy wasn't as belligerent  
3 as Georgie was, but was very upset that Terry had been hurt. Terry had already been taken into  
4 surgery and Georgie was not in a good mood. After a little while at the hospital, my family and I  
5 thought it would be best if we left the Goreys alone. Georgie really didn't want us around.

6 I feel horrible that things turned out the way they did. I loved some like a brother/sister,  
7 but siblings don't go around suing each other and blaming each other for their own mistakes. If  
8 Georgie had closed the door, none of this would have happened.

Defense Witness: Statement of Joey Lieberman

1 My name is Chief Joey Lieberman and I have been on the New Temple Police force for  
2 11 years. I have investigated numerous crimes and have testified at a number of trials due to my  
3 investigations. I graduated from New Temple University about 12 years ago with a degree in  
4 Criminal Justice. I was promoted from sergeant to captain shortly after this incident.

5 On April 15, 2000, I was on duty from 12:00 p.m. until 8:00pm. It was a relatively quiet  
6 day until sometime around 5:00 p.m. when we received a call that there had been a gun fired at  
7 2408 Greenwood Place, with a resulting injury. By the time I arrived on the scene, the victim  
8 had already been taken to the hospital for medical treatment. Only Chris and Al Bushing  
9 remained at the residence. Eventually Al's spouse Pat and Stacy, Georgie's spouse, returned  
10 from the store. Stacy seemed pretty shaken up and started saying things to Al like you shouldn't  
11 drink and keep loaded guns in the house and how stupid s/he was for keeping a key in a potted  
12 plant. S/he started yelling about a time before when the kids got in the room and how s/he told  
13 Al that one of the kids would get shot if s/he wasn't more careful. It was apparent that the best  
14 thing would be for Pat to take Stacy to the hospital so s/he could be with the rest of his/her  
15 family, and so s/he wouldn't interfere with the investigation.

16 Sgt. Cheney arrived soon after Stacy and Pat left and I briefed him/her about what had  
17 happened. We then questioned Al and Chris as to what had occurred at the residence. Al told  
18 me that his/her child had accidentally shot Terry Gorey. S/he did not see the events take place,  
19 so I decided to ask Chris what had happened. S/he told me that Terry had discovered the study  
20 room door was open while Chris was in the bathroom, and when Chris came out, Terry suggested  
21 they go into the study. When they went into the study, Terry found the gun out on the desk.  
22 Terry picked it up and was playing around with the gun and Chris was trying to get him/her to  
23 put the gun down because his/her parents had just bought it. After Terry taunted Chris for a  
24 while by pointing the gun at him/her, Terry noticed that the gun cabinet was open. S/he put the  
25 gun down and went over to the cabinet to check out some other weapons. Chris then claims that  
26 s/he picked up the new gun and was telling Terry not to go near the cabinet, that Chris was going  
27 to return the gun to the cabinet and they would then leave the room. Terry turned to say  
28 something to Chris and as Chris was walking towards the cabinet, s/he tripped on the area rug  
29 and the gun fired. The bullet struck Terry in the upper right thigh. Chris said s/he did not know  
30 the gun was loaded because it was unusual for his/her parents to keep loaded guns in the house.  
31 S/he said that if s/he had known the gun was loaded, s/he never would have picked it up. They  
32 told me that Georgie Gorey, Terry's parent, did not want to wait for an ambulance because s/he  
33 thought it would be faster if s/he took Terry over to the hospital him/herself.

34 I examined the area just in case criminal charges were going to be brought. I examined  
35 the gun and found that it had a few bullets still remaining in it. It was still warm from the firing.  
36 I fingerprinted the gun and found four sets of prints, one set belonging to Al Bushing, one to  
37 Chris Bushing, one to Terry Gorey and one to Georgie Gorey. The area rug was messed as  
38 though someone had tripped over it. There was blood by the cabinet that is Terry Gorey's. The  
39 cabinet where the guns are kept was open, and it appeared as though some of the guns had been  
40 moved. I know how Al keeps the guns in the cabinet because I have been in the study before.

1 From the layout of the room it seemed as though the Bushings' statements were pretty consistent  
2 with the physical evidence I had, up to that point, discovered.

3 Since I could not be considered to have done a complete investigation without getting the  
4 Goreys' statements of what occurred, I went down to the hospital the next day. Terry Gorey was  
5 alert and cooperative, as was his/her father. I asked them to tell me their side of the story and it  
6 differed a bit from the Bushings' version. Terry claims that Chris was waving the gun around  
7 and pointed it at Terry. S/he did not see Chris trip on the area rug, and claims that Chris  
8 intentionally pulled the trigger. When I asked Terry whether or not Chris knew the gun was  
9 loaded, s/he said s/he didn't know if Chris knew there were bullets in the gun. Georgie Gorey  
10 said s/he knew the gun was loaded because Al Bushing had told him/her that s/he had returned  
11 from the range earlier in the day and did not have time to take the bullets out of the gun.

12 Since both sides had different stories, I spoke with the doctor who treated Terry. He told  
13 me that from the angle of entry of the bullet into the side of Terry's left thigh could be  
14 consistent with the Bushings' version of the story, although he could not come to a hard and fast  
15 determination.

16 When I examined the stories and the evidence gathered, I came to the conclusion that  
17 Terry's being shot by Chris Bushing was an accident and that Chris had in fact tripped on the  
18 area rug and the gun accidentally fired. When examining the evidence, I took into account the  
19 veracity of the people involved. The Bushings are generally good people and I cannot ever recall  
20 having any problems with them. Al Bushing is a stand up citizen and I like him/her. I have spent  
21 some time with him/her at the gun club and our views on guns are the same. Like I said earlier, I  
22 have been to the Bushing's home before and I know that Al stores his/her firearms in a very safe  
23 manner. When the call came in over the radio, I couldn't believe that it was about a shooting at  
24 the Bushing residence. Al and I both believe that the Second Amendment entitles American  
25 citizens with the right to own and use guns to their own liking. I am all for gun safety, but at the  
26 same time I am reluctant, as is Al, to support gun laws that restrict the rights of citizens to own  
27 and operate handguns. Chris is also a good kid, one of the brightest in the neighborhood, and  
28 s/he has never had any problems with the law.

29 The Goreys on the other hand, are not what you would call the model family. People who  
30 know Georgie are aware of his/her drinking problem. It is my understanding that, on the night of  
31 the shooting, Georgie and Al had been drinking and that both were feeling the effects of the  
32 alcohol a bit, but it appears from both of their statements that Georgie had a bit more to drink  
33 than Al, and I took this into account when statements were given. I even asked the people at the  
34 hospital the condition of Georgie and they said s/he was intoxicated and was causing major  
35 problems. Good thing I didn't go to the hospital that night or it might have been an even worse  
36 night for the Goreys because I would have had to arrest Georgie.

37 I also took into account Terry Gorey's reputation around the neighborhood. I really hate  
38 having to monitor the kids in the neighborhood, but, from time to time, they get ancy and like to  
39 cause problems. Terry is one of those kids. I have never formally charged Terry with any  
40 violation of the law, but I have caught him/her causing some problems and let him/her off with a  
41 warning. The last thing I want on my conscience is that I cost a kid a shot at college because I  
42 had to arrest him or her for something stupid.

1 I know that retired Sgt. Cheney filed a different report and, in his/her professional  
2 opinion, Chris intentionally fired the weapon. We examined the same evidence and I don't know  
3 how s/he came to that conclusion. I know that Sgt. Cheney is also upset that I received the  
4 promotion to captain and that s/he didn't, but, in all honesty, I deserved it more than s/he did.  
5 What many people don't realize is that Sgt. Cheney has always done sub par work. Too often  
6 has s/he botched an investigation and reached conclusions that were later contradicted. Either  
7 s/he was sloppy in his/her handling of the evidence or questioning of the witnesses, or s/he let  
8 his/her biases cloud his/her judgment. Owlville is such a small place that everyone knows each  
9 other and Sgt. Cheney knew just about everyone in town. It was not unusual to see Sgt. Cheney  
10 let someone s/he knew well get away with a little more than someone else that Sgt. Cheney did  
11 not care for as much. That is why I was promoted to Captain and not Sgt. Cheney.

1 Based on the doctor's statement, the physical evidence gathered and the statements made  
2 by all the parties involved, it is my professional opinion that the gun in Chris Bushing's hands  
3 accidentally discharged when Chris tripped on an area rug, causing injuries to Terry Gorey's  
4 thigh. Since these actions did not constitute an offense in New Temple County, no charges were  
5 brought against the Bushings.

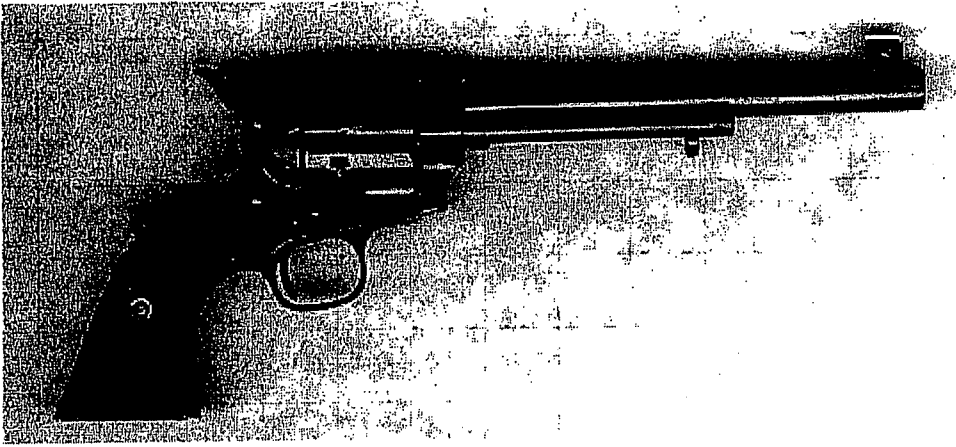
